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Since the journal's foundation in 1962, progress in information processing methodology and in information and communication technology has significantly changed our societies. Medicine and health care have taken full advantage of this progress. *Methods of Information in Medicine* continues to publish papers in the whole range of processing data, information and knowledge in medicine and health care, including research in traditional as well as in new areas of this expanding field. It includes topics such as health information systems and patient records; diagnosis and therapy in health care; biomedical data, signal, and image interpretation; clinical bioinformatics; clinical data analysis and statistical studies; expert systems and knowledge representation; simulation and modeling.
