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GUIDE FOR AUTHORS

ALLERGOLOGIA ET IMMUNOPATHOLOGIA is a forum for those working in the field of asthma, allergy and immunology. Manuscripts related to clinical, epidemiological and experimental allergology and immunopathology will be considered for publication.

Allergologia et Immunopathologia is the official journal of the Spanish Society of Pediatric Allergy and Clinical Immunology.

Manuscripts should be submitted in correct British English at the website <http://ees.elsevier.com/ai/>. Tutorial for the Elsevier Editorial System is available at <http://epsupport.elsevier.com>.

Author Warranty

Manuscripts should be original, unpublished studies not under consideration for publication in any other journal. Manuscripts published in or submitted to another journal will not be considered. The email should include a statement by the author(s) confirming that the manuscript has not been published elsewhere and is not under consideration for publication elsewhere.

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Authorship and ethics

The Journal follows the guidelines of International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (<http://www.icmje.org>), for this reason manuscripts must be prepared following their recommendations.

Authorship

Only those persons who meet with all of the following requirements should appear in the list of authors: 1) to have participated in the conception and carrying out of the work that has given rise to the article in question; 2) to have participated in the writing of the text and in its possible revisions; 3) to have approved the version that is finally to be published.

Conflicts of interest

Authors must disclose any financial or personal relationship which could result in a conflict of interest with regard to the published article. Even if the authors consider that there is none, they must declare it.

Ethical responsibilities

When experiments that have been carried out on humans are described, it must be indicated whether the procedures followed conformed to the ethical guidelines of the appropriate human experiments committee (institutional or regional), and in accordance with the World Health Association and the Helsinki Declaration (<http://www.wma.net/s/ethicsunit/helsinki.htm>). Names, initials or hospital numbers must not be used, especially in the figures. When experiments on animals are

described it must be indicated whether they have followed the guidelines of an institution or international research council, or a national regulatory law on the care and use of laboratory animals.

Informed consents

The authors must mention in the methods section that the procedures used on patients and controls have been done after obtaining informed consent. If photographs or patient data are reproduced, the authors are responsible for obtaining written consent authorising their publication, reproduction and circulation on paper support and the Internet. Likewise, authors must declare that they followed the protocols of their health centers to access details of clinical records, in order to publish their manuscript for research/divulgarion purposes for the scientific community.

Preparation of Manuscripts

Articles must be written in correct scientific British English suitable for publication. The first page, the body of the manuscript (including references and tables) and each figure should be in individual files. Submissions should be double-spaced and without any reference formatting such as RefmanTM, EndNoteTM, or Word references tool, etc. Manuscripts should be organized as follows:

ORIGINAL ARTICLES

Title Page

The title page should contain the following information: title; a brief running title; first and last names of the author(s) and their affiliations. The name, mailing address, city and country, and fax and e-mail of the author to whom all correspondence should be sent should also be included in this page. Funding and acknowledgements should also be placed here. This title page should be uploaded as a separate page.

Manuscript

Abstract

A separate abstract page should give a summary of the complete manuscript in a maximum of 250 words. The abstract must have the following headings: Background (describe the rationale for the study); Methods (brief description); Results (brief presentation of significant results); and Conclusions (succinct statement of data interpretation). After the abstract, list five to nine key words in alphabetical order to facilitate indexing.

Main text

The article must have the following headings: Introduction; Materials and Methods; Results; and Discussion. The text is limited to a maximum of 3,500 words, not including the abstract and figure legends. There should be no more than 40 references.

References

References should be numbered in order of appearance in the text and should conform to Vancouver style. References to journal articles: 1st. Include the surname and initials of the six first authors and, if more, add "et al.". 2nd. Title of article in the original language. 3rd. Journal title abbreviated according to the abbreviations listed in Current Contents. 4th. Year of publication, volume and first and last page.

INSTRUCTIONS TO AUTHORS

In-text reference numbers should be put into brackets. Any formatting of references either by specific reference manager or text processor software cannot be accepted. Use ranges separated by hyphens when necessary: (1, 2, 3-6, 9)

EXAMPLE:

Harvey RP, Comer C, Sanders B, Westley R, Marsh W, Shapiro H et al. Model of outcomes assessment of antihistamine use for seasonal allergic rhinitis. *J Allergy Clin Immunol.* 1996;97:1233-41

References to books and monographs should include surnames and initials of author(s), title in the original language, edition, place, publisher, year of publication and page(s) cited.

EXAMPLE:

Lukacs NW: The role of chemokines in allergic airway inflammation. In: HEbert CA ed.: *Chemokines in Disease. Biology and Clinical Research.* Totowa. N.Y. Human Press, 1999: p. 111-21.

Tables

Tables should be numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals, each typed on a separate page in the main document, and should be accompanied by self-explanatory legends. The total combined number of tables and figures should not exceed 6.

Figures and Illustrations

All graphs, drawings and photographs are considered figures and should be numbered in sequence with Arabic numerals. All legends should be typed on a separate page in the main document. Figures should be sent in separate files in electronic format (TIF, GIF or JPG, high quality). Both photographs and graphs must have a minimum resolution of 300 dpi with a maximum file size of 2MB. Colour pictures might be accepted should the editor consider them useful. Patient's identity must remain secret or permission should be obtained. Every picture or graphic should have a foot-legend. The total combined number of tables and figures should not exceed 6.

Abbreviations and symbols

Only generally accepted abbreviations and symbols should be used. Unfamiliar ones must be defined when first used.

REVIEW ARTICLES

Reviews of current work reflecting progress in various fields of asthma, allergy and immunology are requested from recognized specialists. Voluntary contributions will be subject to consideration by the Editorial Board. The text is limited to 7,000 words not including the abstract, which does not need to be structured, figure legends, and references. Up to 10 figures or tables will be accepted. References are limited to a maximum of 150. Figures and tables should be displayed as in the Original Articles section.

POINT OF VIEW

Original opinions and interpretation of current data or hypothesis on different topics related to asthma, allergy or clinical immunology are included in this section, which does not have any fixed structure and need not include tables or figures. The maximum number of words is 2,000 and of references, 15. Points of view are usually requested by the Editorial Board, but voluntary contributions will be welcomed and considered. Point of view should contain an abstract of up to 150 words.

SERIES

Allergologia et Immunopathologia will publish articles on specific topics that could be of help for the clinicians either for their practice or for their research. Articles which are related to the same topic will be grouped under a specific series. Those articles will not necessarily be published consecutively. Articles in this section should not have more than 3000 words, 4 tables and/or figures and 15 references. These articles do not have any specific structure. Although the Editorial Board will usually request those series from specific authors, ideas and contributions to this section are welcomed.

RESEARCH LETTERS

Short research reports or cases showing exceptional interest will be considered for this section. The manuscript should begin with the salutation "To the Editor" and should not be divided into sections, but written in a letter format using different paragraphs whenever considered convenient to separate different pieces of information. The text is limited to a maximum of 1500 words, not including legends and references (letters exceeding this limit will be returned to the authors for shortening, prior to review). The main text should end with the author name(s), institution(s) and location(s). Up to 3 figures or tables will be accepted. References, formatted as in the Original Articles section, are limited to a maximum of 10. Figures and tables should be displayed as indicated in the aforementioned section.

Research letters should not have an abstract, but should have a title page to be uploaded separately from the main text. However, a non-structured short summary of 150-200 words would be required for the submission system for reviewing purposes. This summary should only be included in the appropriate abstract box in the online submission system, but not as part of the publishable text. In order to index the letter in the bibliographic databases, a list of five to nine keywords should be included in the title page, which additionally should contain the same information as the title page in the Original Articles section.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Only letters related to articles published in the journal will be considered. The letter will be sent to the author of the article, who will have 4 weeks in which to answer. Letters should contain fewer than 700 words and must contain no more than 5 references. After publication of the reply, no further correspondence will be accepted. The editorial office will inform authors of manuscript acceptance by the Editorial Board and the estimated publication date. In accordance with the referees' reports, papers may be rejected or modifications suggested, if necessary. Authors are entirely responsible for the views, conclusions and methods presented in their manuscripts.

Proofs

Page proofs will be sent to authors for correction and should be returned within 3 days. Proofs not returned in time to meet the publication date will either be rescheduled or published without the authors' corrections, in which case the Editors do not accept responsibility for any errors that might have been made during typesetting.

News and Announcements

Items of interest to allergists and immunologists, such as announcements of scientific congresses, may be sent to the editorial office for inclusion in the appropriate section.
