

Instructions for Authors

Acta Physiologica Hungarica publishes original research papers, review articles, short communications (2 or 4 pages) and rapid preliminary notes on all aspects of physiological/pathophysiological science and medicine. Papers are accepted on the basis of scientific significance and suitability for publication and on the understanding that they have not been published, submitted or accepted for publication elsewhere.

Papers submitted for publication are subject to peer review. Papers accepted for publication by the Editorial Board are subject to editorial revision. The Publishing Agreement will be sent to the authors with the final revised version of the paper.

Permissions. It is the responsibility of the author to obtain written permission for quotations, and for the reprinting of illustrations or tables.

Preparation of manuscripts. Manuscripts should be written in clear, concise, and grammatically correct English. The printout should be typed double-spaced with 2.5 cm (1 inch) wide margins. Pages should be numbered consecutively (in succession), the title page being page one. The order should be as follows: title page, abstract, keywords, text, appendix, acknowledgments, notes, references, tables, figure captions. Three copies of the manuscript should be submitted. An electronic version of the manuscript (including the figures) should also be submitted in IBM compatible Word for Windows file.

Title should be a clear and concise statement of the contents in not more than 20 words. A short running title of no more than 50 characters should also be supplied. This is followed by the authors' initials (full first name of women) and the surname, and the name of the institutions where the work was done.

The mailing address, e-mail address, phone and fax numbers of the corresponding author must also be given in a footnote to the first page.

Abstract should not exceed 200 words and should outline briefly the purpose, results (new findings supported by data) and conclusions of the study.

Keywords should not exceed 10.

Text of the paper should be divided into sections with the headings: Introduction, Materials and Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgement, References.

Introduction should state briefly the nature, purpose, and reasoning of the work and cite recent important work by others.

Footnotes should only be used if absolutely necessary.

References in the text should be cited by names only if they are part of the sentence: "Hilton (5) described earlier..." otherwise they should be indicated by the reference number(s) in parentheses (3, 7, 12). If there are more than two authors, the name of the first author should be used, followed by et al. List the references in alphabetical order at the end of the paper. The style and punctuation of references should conform to that used in the journal. See the following examples:

– for journals: Names and initials of all authors, colon, title of the paper. Journal title abbreviated according to the style used in Index Medicus, volume number, first and last pages, year of publication (in parentheses)

Székely M, Szélényi Z: Endotoxin fever in the rat. *Acta Physiol. Hung.* 53, 265–277 (1979)

– for books: Names and initials of authors/editors, year (in parentheses): Title. Publisher, place of publication

Schmid RF (1978): *Fundamentals of Sensory Physiology*. Springer Verlag, New York–Heidelberg–Berlin

– for chapters: Name(s) and initial(s) of author(s), year (in parentheses): Title of chapter. In: Title of book, name(s) and initial(s) of editor(s), publisher, place of publication, first and last page numbers

Dettler JC (1978): Biochemical variation. In: Textbook of Human Genetics, eds Fraser O, Mayo O, Blackwell Scientific Publications, Oxford, pp. 5–115

Tables should be comprehensive to the reader without reference to the text. They should be typed on separate sheets and have a concise heading each typed above the table. Tables are numbered consecutively with Roman numerals.

Figures (line drawings, diagrams, photographs) should be numbered consecutively with Arabic numerals. Three original copies should be sent. Figures prepared by computer should be mentioned in the text and also be sent on a floppy diskette. The figure number, the name of the first author should be identified on the top of the figure on the back in soft pencil.

Drawings and graphs should be prepared in black India ink on white or tracing paper of good quality photographs on glossy paper as high-contrast copies at their expected final size. (No xerox copies accepted.)

Good quality computer graphs produced on a laser printer are acceptable. A limited number of color photographs will be accepted but the extra cost of reproduction in color must be paid by the authors. Legends to figures should be provided on a separate sheet. All figures should be referred to in the text and their approximate place indicated on the margin.

Abbreviations and symbols. All abbreviations should be spelled out when first used in the text. Please identify unusual symbols on the margin. Quantities should be expressed in SI units.

Advertisements may be inserted by the rates of the Publisher.

Proofs. One set of proofs will be sent to the corresponding author, who is requested to return it to the Editor within 48 hours of receipt. Alterations in the illustrations are expensive and should be avoided.

Self-archiving, Offprints and PDF files. The Author is entitled to self-archive the preprint version of his/her manuscript. The preprint version is the Author's manuscript or the galley proof or the Author's manuscript along with the corrections made in the course of the peer review process. The Author's right to self-archive is irrespective of the format of the preprint (.doc, .tex., .pdf) version and self-archiving includes the free circulation of this file via e-mail or publication of this preprint on the Author's webpage or on the Author's institutional repository with open or restricted access. When self-archiving a paper the Author should clearly declare that the archived file is not the final published version of the paper, he/she should quote the correct citation and enclose a link to the published paper ([http://dx.doi.org/\[DOI of the Article without brackets\]](http://dx.doi.org/[DOI of the Article without brackets])). Authors can use the **OOpenArt (optional open article)** publication model for a specific publishing fee. Full-text of an OOpenArt paper is freely accessible through the official website of the journal. These papers are also published in the printed journals as well as all the traditional ones. Peer-review process and quality requirements are the same in case of both traditional and OOpenArt manuscripts. Both accepted new manuscripts and papers published earlier can be OOpenArt.

The price of an OOpenArt article is **900 EUR (1125 USD) + VAT**, where applicable, but it can be even less. Akadémiai Kiadó offers **50% discount** for corresponding authors of **a)** subscribing institutions, **b)** Hungarian institutions, **c)** institutions of low- and middle-income countries. Discounts may not be combined, all these authors should pay **450 EUR (562 USD)**. The above OOpenArt fee does not include any normal (excess) page fees and colour charges.

By executing the Optional Open Article Agreement and paying the OOpenArt fee the Author retains the ownership and further rights related to the Article while ensures the wide accessibility of the Article in the written and electronic media controlled by Akadémiai Kiadó.
