Basic Information

Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas is the official journal of the Spanish Society of Digestive Pathology, the Spanish Society of Digestive Endoscopy and the Spanish Association of Digestive Ecography.

The journal firstly appeared in 1918. It was founded by professors R. Luis Y Yagüe, Fidel Fernández and L. Urrutia. It has been publishing manuscripts monthly (12 numbers a year) without interruption since 1944 and it has been declared of public interest.

Its main objective is to increase and update knowledge in the area of the gastrointestinal tract, specially in the fields of digestive surgery, digestive endoscopy, digestive ecography and internal medicine.

The abbreviated title is Rev. esp. enferm. dig. and it should be used in bibliography.

Instructions to Authors

Scope and policy

Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas publishes original papers, viewpoints, special contributions, rapid communications, letters to the Editor, editorials on basic and clinical research, and other special articles on all aspects referring to the gastrointestinal tract. Manuscripts must be written following recommendations issued by the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (N Engl J Med 1997; 336: 309-15), and according to the following guidelines:

Paper review: please send your manuscript along with three copies in a strong paper envelope addressed to: Sociedad Española de Patología Digestiva. Francisco Silvela, 69, 2^oC - 28028 Madrid. Spain.

Form and preparation of manuscripts

Cover letter

Authors will explain the original contribution of their presented work in 3-4 lines.

Manuscript

—Authors must send four complete manuscript sets in Spanish with double-space typing in all sections (including references, tables, figure legends, and page footnotes). DIN-A4 paper sheets must be used with 2.5-cm lateral, upper and lower margins.

—Pages must have consecutive numbering including the title page. The sending of manuscripts in both printed and magnetic (diskette) form is encouraged to facilitate text reproduction.

Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas publishes all papers both in Spanish and English. Manuscripts should be submitted in Spanish for consideration. Once a manuscript has been accepted, its author(s) should submit an English version within a month's term after acceptance date. Should the translated paper fail to be received at the Journal's editorial office within this timeframe, paper acceptance will be cancelled and the paper will not be

published.

—Maximum manuscript length will be 9 sheets (2,500 words) regardless of abstract, references, tables and figures, and a maximum of 5 tables and/or figures may be included. For rapid communications maximum length is 4 sheets (1,500 words), with a total of 3 tables and/or figures. Letters to the Editor should not exceed two sheets (700 words) and six references, and may include 1 table or figure. Publication of letters referring to papers published in REED will be preferential. The Editorial Committee reserves the right to edit letters received.

—Sections should be included in the following order: title page, summary, introduction, methods, results discussion, references, tables, figure legends, and figures.

—Paging will consist of consecutive numbering starting at the title page.

Abbreviations should be avoided except for measuring units. Please, avoid using abbreviations in the title and summary. The full term substituted for by an abbreviation must precede the latter, except for standard measuring units. Units should be preferentially expressed as International System units (Système International: SI Units). Chemical, physical, biologic and clinical units must be always strictly defined.

Title page

—This section must include: full title, running title (below 50 characters) for headings, author name(s), name and location of department or facility where the paper originated, author name and address for correspondence, and acknowledgment of any intervening grant or financial support.

—The title should not exceed 85 characters, and must reflect the manuscript's main subject. Inclusion of sentences such as “A propos of a case?” or “Literature review?” is not encouraged.

—Please include full name, telephone number (also fax number and e-mail address if available) and address of the author to whom correspondence, galley proofs and offprint requests will be posted. These data must be printed in the lower right quadrant of this first page.

Summary

—Translated into English, this is the sole manuscript part that will be included in international data bases together with the title and keywords. Abbreviations, notes and references must not be included in it.

—Length must not exceed 250 words, and the following headings and information should be included:

Objective: the study's purpose and primary goal, and main hypothesis if available.

Experimental design: study design indicating randomization, blinding, diagnostic test assessment criteria, and time orientation (retrospective, prospective).

Subjects: selection procedures, inclusion criteria, number of participants at study onset and completion.

Results: the study's most relevant results, including most significant data and statistical evaluation.

Conclusions: only conclusions directly supported by data should be included, together with their clinical applicability (generalization is to be avoided) and the potential need for additional studies before clinical use feasibility; both positive and negative findings of scientific interest should be equally highlighted.

—A list of keywords should be included in the same page. Keywords (three to eight in total) complement the title and help in paper identification. Terms obtained from the Index Medicus medical subject headings (MeSH) list must be used.

English summary

—An accurate, correct English translation of the summary. It must be enclosed in a different sheet, and title and keywords (in English) must also be included.

Introduction

—A brief overview and description of the paper's objective.

Methods

—These will be described in detail for assessment and repetition by other researchers.

—Ethical standards met by researchers for both animal and human studies must be briefly described. Studies in humans must have express authorization by the local ethics committee for clinical trials, which must be clearly stated in the manuscript.

—Statistical methods used must be described. Studies must include experiments and/or control groups; otherwise, actions implemented for bias avoidance must be explained, as well as their potential effect on study conclusions.

Results

—Results must be concise and clear, with a minimum necessary number of tables and figures. Unnecessary data duplication or repetitions should be avoided both in the text and the figures and tables.

Discussion

—Except in review articles, a thorough inclusion of literature references is not necessary. Own findings shall be related to those of previous investigations, and differences between results obtained and those seen by other authors will be noted. The discussion should not include new results and will not merely reproduce the results section.

References

—Bibliography references will be identified in the text by Arabic numbers between parenthesis.

—References will be double-spaced and consecutively numbered following the order in which they are quoted in the text.

—Personal communications and unpublished data should not be included (they may be quoted between parenthesis in the text).

—Journal name abbreviations must be those included in the National Library of Medicine's Index Medicus.

—Style and punctuation must conform to the requirements of *Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas*. For example:

Tables

—Double-spaced and in separate sheets, tables should be identified by Arabic numbers and a title in their upper margin, and must include explanatory footnotes.

Figure legends

—Figure legends will be double-spaced, and figures will be identified by Arabic numbers in order of appearance.

—Legends should include all information needed for accurate interpretation, thus rendering text interrogation unnecessary.

Figures

The photographs should have a resolution of 300 pixels/inch if they are made in tif or jpg format. It is necessary that the minimum size was 10 cm wide.

—Four sets of black and white photographs on glossy paper (photographs of laser printer-generated drawings offer better quality) to be included in separate envelopes.

—Figures must not repeat data already included in the text.

—Object photographs and microphotographs should include a ruler allowing measure calibration. Symbols and arrows included to guide interpretation must contrast with the background.

—The first author's name, figure number, and an arrow pointing upwards must be written in pencil or on an adhesive tag at the back of each print.

—Patient name and other patient-identifying data should not be included.

—Black and white microphotographs are better than colour microphotographs for reproduction. Colour illustrations will be included only when they represent an outstanding contribution to paper comprehension. Publication costs regarding colour illustrations may be charged to the author. If members of Sociedad Española de Patología Digestiva, authors are entitled to include three colour illustrations free of charge provided colour is deemed essential by the publishers.

ETHIC RESPONSIBILITIES

—When experiments carried out in humans are described, that procedures performed met ethic guidelines issued by the corresponding (institutional or regional) committee on human experimentation, and by the Declaration of Helsinki in 1975 (1983 Revision) must be indicated. Particularly in figures, names, initials and hospital numbers must not be included. When experiments carried out in animals are described, accordance to guidelines issued by an international research council or institution, or a national law on laboratory animal care and use must be indicated.

—Publication authorisation by the research funding institution.

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—Conflict of interest: REED expects authors to declare any commercial involvements that may represent a conflict of interest in connection with their articles.

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1. Having taken part in the conception and implementation of the work that gave rise to the paper.
2. Having taken part in the writing of the text and its potential revisions.
3. Having authorised the final version for publication.

Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas rejects liability regarding any authorship conflicts arising in published papers.

INFORMED CONSENT

Within Methods, authors must mention that procedures used for patients and control subjects were performed after their informed consent was obtained.

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The annex to these guidelines must be signed by all participating authors and enclosed with the manuscript.

EDITORIAL PROCESS

All manuscripts will be evaluated by the Editorial Committee of Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas, and/or two external consultants. Evaluation will be according to a protocol established for this purpose, and will remain anonymous; author names and paper origin, therefore, must not be included in any of the manuscript sections. Should the paper need corrections, these must be sent to the publisher within less than three months; beyond this deadline, papers will be sent back to their authors, and submitted versions will be rejected for publication. No paper will be definitely accepted until all corrections have been completed. To facilitate work by the Editorial Committee, authors must enclose a letter specifying modifications (section, page, line) and diverging viewpoints, if existent when submitting a previously evaluated manuscript. Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas reserves the right to introduce changes and modifications in the study, without altering its contents, in order to improve understanding. Papers will be published in groups according to scientific criteria.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

1. Revista Española de Enfermedades Digestivas acknowledges receipt of submitted papers; these will be reviewed by the Editorial Committee and most commonly by two additional external consultants.
2. **PROOF CORRECTION:** Galley proofs will be sent to the corresponding author, unless otherwise specified. These proofs must be carefully revised and errors found therein should be marked; corrected proofs must then be sent back to the publisher within 48 hours. The Editorial Committee reserves the right to accept or reject author's corrections on the proofs.
3. **EDITORIAL POLICY:** Judgements and opinions expressed in published papers and communications are those of the author(s), and do not necessarily express those of the Editorial Committee. Both the Editorial Committee and the publishing house reject liability for such materials. The Editorial Committee and the publishing house do not guarantee or support any products advertised in REED; they do not guarantee manufacturer statements on advertised products or services, either.

4. OFFPRINTS: Corresponding authors will receive 25 paper offprints immediately after publication, except for the opinion and letters to the editor sections. Should a higher number of offprints be required, this must be communicated to the publisher upon corrected proof submission.

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
