

**1. General instructions.** The author(s) transfer(s) the copyright to his/their article to Springer-Verlag effective if and when the article is accepted for publication. The copyright covers the exclusive and unlimited rights to reproduce and distribute the article in any form of reproduction (printing, electronic media or any other form); it also covers translation rights for all languages and countries. For U.S. authors the copyright is transferred to the extent transferable. Authors should submit one original manuscript (typed on one side of the paper only) plus two copies of the entire text (photocopied on both sides of the paper to save on postage) and two sets of figures mounted on normal bond paper. Manuscripts must be accompanied by the "Copyright Transfer Statement" (the form is regularly published in this journal). If a paper is rejected, only the original figures will be returned.

In addition to the normal publication process (whereby an article is submitted to the journal and access to that article is granted to customers who have purchased a subscription), Springer now provides an alternative publishing option: Springer Open Choice. A Springer Open Choice article receives all the benefits of a regular 'subscription-based' article, but in addition is made available publicly through Springer's online platform SpringerLink. To publish via Springer Open Choice, upon acceptance please visit [www.springeronline.com/openchoice](http://www.springeronline.com/openchoice) to complete the relevant order form and provide the required payment information. Payment must be received in full before publication or articles will be published as regular subscription-model articles. We regret that Springer Open Choice cannot be ordered for published articles.

**Regular papers and Case reports** should include: Title page, Abstract, Key words, Introduction, Materials and methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgements, References, tables and figure legends. In shorter Regular papers, the Results and Discussion sections may be combined. All parts of the manuscripts should be typed double spaced with wide margins on one side of standard A4 paper. Abbreviations should be limited to those in common use and should be spelled out the first time they occur. The places where the figures are to be inserted should be indicated in the left margin. The Materials and methods section, formulas, footnotes, and tables are published in small print. Other sections that the authors want to have published in small print should be marked by a vertical line and the letter "P" in the left margin. Regular papers should not exceed 20 typewritten pages. Five pages is the maximum for **Case reports**.

**Express communications** should not exceed 1000 to 1500 words (110 to 150 lines), have 20 references or fewer, and no more than a total of three tables or illustrations. Publication within four months after submission will be guaranteed.

**Authors submitting diskettes are requested to follow the technical instructions printed in each issue of the journal.**

Manuscripts should emphasize what is new and important. They should be written in clear and concise English. The Editors suggest that authors whose mother tongue is not English have manuscripts reviewed by a scientist who knows the field and who can critically evaluate the English. All manuscripts are subject to copy editing. Form and content must be carefully checked to exclude the need for corrections in proof. A charge will be made for changes introduced after the manuscript has been set in type.

**2. Title page.** The title page should include the name(s) of the author(s); the title of the article; the name of the institution where the work was done; footnotes, if any, to the title; the name and address of the corresponding author; a telex or fax number. In the title, subtitle and all sub-headings, only the first word should be capitalized and words that are always capitalized.

**3. Abstract and key words.** Each paper must be preceded by a brief resume of the most important results and conclusions in no more than 250 words. Immediately following the abstract, no more than 5 key words are to be supplied for subject indexing. They should be taken from Index Medicus (Medical Subject Headings) or be composed by analogy on the same principles.

**4. Footnotes.** Footnotes to the title of the paper appear without a symbol; those to the text are numbered consecutively; footnotes to tables should be indicated by superscript lower-case letters.

**5. References.** Correct references and text citations are responsibilities of the authors. All references cited in the text and tables should be listed under the first author's name in alphabetical order. Articles by two authors should be listed alphabetically according to the second author's name, then chronologically. Articles by three or more authors should be listed chronologically. For **journal articles** give name(s) and initial(s) of all author(s), year of publication (in parentheses), title, journal name as abbreviated in Index Medicus, volume number, first and last page numbers; for **books, both authored and edited**, give name(s) and initial(s) of all author(s), year of publication (in parentheses), title, editors (if any), edition, volume number, publisher, city, first and last page numbers. If the entire book is referenced, no page numbers are required.

Single publications cited in the text should be referenced as numbers in square brackets referring to an alphabetically ordered and numbered list of references. Only published papers and those in press should be included in the reference list. Unpublished data and personal communications should be cited in the text, in parentheses.

**6. Illustrations.** Figures should be restricted to those needed for clarity. A maximum of 8 figures is allowed. The costs involved in the reproduction of further figures must be met by the author. Except in review articles, previously published illustrations should not be submitted. *Color illustrations* are free of charge. Individual illustrations and those that are to appear together as one figure should be mounted on regular bond paper. Figures should not exceed the page print area of 176 mm × 236 mm or the column width of 86 mm, including the space necessary for legends. Magnification should be indicated by a bar scale. All figures should be mounted separately and numbered consecutively. They should be labeled lightly on the back with a soft pencil to indicate the top of the figure, the figure number, the author's name, and the manuscript title.

**Line drawings.** Please submit mounted good-quality prints that are the correct size for direct 1:1 reproduction. Computer drawings are acceptable provided they are of comparable quality to line drawings. Lines and curves must be smooth. Letters, numbers or symbols used as labels should be clearly legible. Letters 2 mm high are recommended.

**Halftone illustrations.** Please submit mounted photographic prints of good technical quality and contrast that are the desired size for reproduction. Letters or numbers used as labels should be about 2–3 mm high.

**Legends.** Please submit concise and informative legends on a separate page with magnifications for micrographs.

**7. Offprints.** Offprints may be ordered at cost price when the page proofs are returned.

**The goal of the Editors and the Publisher is to publish important regular papers as rapidly as possible. Manuscripts not prepared according to the above instructions will be returned for revision before editorial processing and review.**
