

1. Copyright

The author(s) transfer(s) the copyright to his/her/their article to Springer-Verlag effective if and when the article is accepted for publication. The copyright covers the exclusive and unlimited rights to reproduce and distribute the article in any form of reproduction (printing, electronic media or any other form); it also covers translation rights for all languages and countries. For U.S. authors the copyright is transferred to the extent transferable.

The final manuscript must be accompanied by the **Copyright Transfer Statement** (the form is printed at the end of these instructions).

Authors wishing to include figures or text passages that have already been published elsewhere are required to obtain **permission** from the copyright holder(s) and to include evidence that such permission has been granted when submitting their papers. Any material received without such evidence will be assumed to originate from the authors.

2. Submission to the Editor

Articles should be submitted to one of the editors. Electronic submissions are preferred and encouraged. Submissions in paper form should be in triplicate.

3. Electronic submission

After notification of acceptance of your article by the Managing Editor, please prepare your manuscript exactly in accordance with the Instructions for the technical preparation of manuscript.

You can send the text and illustrations to us either online or on a physical data medium.

The data name should be memorisable (e.g., author name and/or title keyword), have no more than 8 characters, and include no accents or special symbols. Use only the name extensions that the program assigns automatically.

T_EX macros

Authors are encouraged to ask for Springer-Verlag's T_EX-macro packages, either by e-mail to Kunz@springer.de or from: <http://www.springer.de/author/tex/help-journals.html> or directly via ftp to <ftp.springer.de> with user id ftp or anonymous. Please enter your e-mail address as password. The files reside in /pub/tex/latex/svjour.

It is important to ensure that the text is identical in the hard copy and in the soft copy.

4. Illustrations

Send the illustrations separately from the text, i.e., not integrated into it. As well as data for the illustrations, **always send printouts for reference.**

Line drawings (vector graphics). Vector graphics exported from a drawing program should be stored in EPS format. Fonts used in the graphics must be included (command: "Convert text objects [fonts] to path outlines"). Please do not **draw with hairlines. The minimum line width is 0.2 mm (i.e., 0.567 pt) measured at the final scale.**

5. Text

Papers should preferably be written in **English**. Authors whose mother tongue is not English are advised to seek the assistance of a native English speaker who is familiar with the topic of the paper. Before a manuscript is prepared, these instructions and a copy of the journal should be consulted to ensure that the requirements concerning form and style of presentation are observed.

Manuscripts should be written in **clear and simple language**. Form and content should be carefully checked to exclude the need for corrections in proof. A charge will be made for changes introduced after the page make-up has been made. The places at which figures and tables are to be inserted should be indicated in the text.

The title page must contain the title, the complete name(s) of the author(s), the name and full address of the laboratory or institution where the work was done, and the address to which proofs should be sent. If the title requires a footnote, this must also be included on the title page and indicated by an asterisk.

Abstract. Each paper must start with an abstract that summarizes its content. Abstracts should not exceed 100 words.

The **Introduction** should be concise and define the scope of the work in relation to other work done in the same field. It should not, as a rule, give an exhaustive review of the literature.

Footnotes other than those referring to the title, should be numbered consecutively and placed at the foot of the manuscript page on which they belong (not at the end of paper).

References. References should be cited by number or label in square brackets, for example [5], [5,7,10], [5–8], or [AGV, E1]. All references cited in the text are to be listed at the end of the paper in alphabetical order.

Responsibility for the accuracy of bibliographic references rests entirely with the author(s).

Figures must be restricted to the minimum needed to clarify the text. All figures must be mentioned in the text and must be numbered in the same order as they are first referred to in the text. The references to figures should be as follows: Fig. 3, Figs. 4, 5. For submission line drawing, please see **Section 4** of these instructions.

Captions must be concise and appended to the text. They should provide a brief, self-sufficient description of each figure. Information given in the captions should not be repeated in the text.

Offprints. Fifty (50) offprints of each paper will be supplied free of charge. Additional offprints are available in lots of 100, provided the order form is received with the corrected proofs.
