

Palaeontographica Abteilung B – Instructions for Authors

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Section B of *Palaeontographica* publishes original and qualified contributions of palaeobotanical, palaeo-palynological, palaeo-xylotomical and phytostратigraphical interest preferably in English language. Articles in English from non native authors have to be proofread before submission by a native speaker to be quoted in the acknowledgements. German or French language is possible in exceptional cases, but authors should contact one of the editors-in-chief before submission.

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References must include the author's name and year of publication of each paper.

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- Title page should contain:
 - Title of the paper (as short and precise as possible; subtitles and words in parentheses are to be avoided)
 - First and last names of the author(s), affiliations, addresses, contact details of the corresponding author (e-mail address, telephone number)
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 - Explanations of special features and abbreviations in the text
- Methodology and techniques used in the investigations, material investigated
- Results and discussion
- Conclusions or Summary
- Acknowledgements or recognition of research assistance
- References
- Appendix or glossary
- Plates and explanation of plates

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Nomenclature must strictly follow the most recent issue of the International Code of Nomenclature for algae, fungi and plants (from 2012 onwards: 'Melbourne Code'). Spelling of author names should follow Brummit & Powel (1992; 1996) and the 'Authors of Plant Names' online database in the International Plant Names Index database (www.ipni.org). Each taxon name must be accompanied by the author(s) name(s) and year of publication when introduced for the first time in the text.

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In synonymy lists, species names and literature references are separated by a dash in cases where the describer is not the original describer of the species. Examples:

1821 *Annularia spinulosa* STERNBERG, vol. 1, 2: p. 32, pl. 19, fig. 4.
2000 *Annularia spinulosa* STERNBERG – BARTHEL, p. 39, figs 2–5.

Referring to types and typoids indicates the location of collection (abbreviated) and catalogue number of the fossil. It is strongly recommended that all materials described and figured in the manuscript are kept in a public collection.

Stratigraphic nomenclature

Please observe the guidelines of the International Commission on Stratigraphy (ICS) on their website for using stratigraphic divisions and names of the most recent International Stratigraphic Chart and for correct use of any stratigraphic terms.

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Illustrations (line-drawings; diagrams; photographs if necessary) in the text are to be labeled as "Text-fig." and numbered consecutively. Labeling must be large enough to allow necessary reductions in size (characters must have a final size of at least 2 mm (after reduction)). Indicate the scale for all figures in the explanatory text and use a scale bar whenever possible. Avoid the use of serif typefaces when labeling illustrations. Please indicate the approximate place(s) in the text where the text-figure(s) should be located.
