

## Instructions to Authors

### Objectives

*Science Progress* welcomes reviews, short articles and commentaries on topical subjects, letters and book reviews.

Contributions should treat subjects of genuine value and interest to the scientific community and the wider public. The context should be established in the introduction. Contributions to *Science Progress* should aid significantly the process of learning in the fields of science, technology and medicine.

### Types of contributions

Reviews should be full length articles of approximately 6000 words, including space occupied by diagrams. A summary of up to 150 words and up to 10 keywords are required.

Shorter articles of about 2000 words should address recent discoveries that have either solved long standing problems or opened vast new fields of study or application.

Commentaries of around 1000 words should consider topical issues that are generating, or are likely to generate, high level debate within the general community.

### Submission of articles

There are no page charges.

Articles should be submitted by [www.scienceprogress.co.uk](http://www.scienceprogress.co.uk) The corresponding author must create an account through which they can submit articles to any Science Reviews 2000 Ltd journal. The author uploads the paper and gives full details of all the other authors on the paper. The submitting author will be the only contact to whom all correspondence regarding referees comments, editorial matters, and page proofs will be sent, they should ensure that the other authors are aware of the progress of their paper.

### Editorial process

Receipt of the paper will be acknowledged. The reference number allocated should be quoted in all subsequent correspondence. Authors will be able to monitor the progress of their paper by accessing the journal database. As soon as a paper is received it undergoes a peer refereeing process and comments will be communicated to the corresponding author through the database. The corresponding author will receive details for downloading their page proofs by E-mail. These proofs should be checked carefully and corrections returned to the Editorial Office by the date indicated on the first page of the proofs. If no notification of corrections is received by the date that is specified, the publisher will assume that no corrections are required.

### Reprints

The corresponding author will have the opportunity to download a copy of their paper via the internet from which reprints may be generated.

### Copyright

The corresponding author will be required to agree to an exclusive copyright license held by Science Reviews 2000 Ltd.

### Format of articles

All major word processing programs are accepted. Figures and tables should be incorporated in the same file as the main text. Papers should be written in English. Papers in which the standard of English is inadequate will not be considered. Authors whose first language is not English are advised to have their manuscript checked before submission. They may also purchase a Language polishing service via <http://www.charlesworth-group.com/our-services/author-services/language-polishing.html> An abstract of about 100 words and up to 10 keywords should accompany each article.

The name, scientific and academic qualifications, present address and E-mail address and a brief (50 words) biography of the author(s) should be supplied with the manuscript together with a passport style photograph.

### Figures and Illustrations

Diagrams, graphs and photographs should be designated as "Figures" and numbered sequentially throughout the text. Where it is necessary to use an illustration that has been published elsewhere, the author must supply a copy of the illustration and obtain permission to republish it from the holder of the copyright. The permission should be forwarded with the manuscript. A limited number of colour photographs can be printed in each issue.

### References

The reference list should not exceed 60 key reviews and original papers. References should be cited in the text by the use of a superscript number attached to the relevant statement. References should be numbered consecutively throughout the paper with a single number for each unique reference work. In the reference list, the details should comprise all surnames and initials, the full title of the article or chapter, the book or journal title (abbreviated according to the *World List*), date, volume number and page range, and in the case of a book, the publisher and place of publication.
